Mr. John Brewer, Washington representative of R.G. Dun & Co., called at my office on April 10, 1922, inquiring concerning my knowledge of Dr. Jacob Nosovitsky.

Mr. Brewer stated that some of the rubber tire concerns were interested in ascertaining the reliability and financial standing of Nosovitsky, and that they had been informed that I had knowledge concerning him.

I informed Mr. Brewer that Nosovitsky had been employed by the Department of Justice in 1917 and 1918, I believed, before my connection with the Bureau of Investigation, and left the Department of Justice to go with the British Secret Service, and has at no time subsequently been employed by the Department of Justice; that through private individuals, however, his work among radicals in the United States and abroad has been made accessible to the government.

I stated that I knew nothing concerning the financial standing of Nosovitsky, but had found him reliable in so far as his work was concerned, and had at no time found him dishonest in his dealings with myself or other parties; that I believed he is extremely extravagant, but in no way addicted to the appropriation of money for his own personal use; that he is inclined to be a very free spender with his friends.

Dear Mr. Burns:-

There is a man in New York City by the name of Dr. Jacob Nosovitsky who last February started in the retail automobile tire and accessories business. Upon statements made in writing as to his credit and financial status, which were apparently false, he obtained credit from tire manufacturers for merchandise of a value of about \$16,000. In the first week of April, 1922, Nosovitsky started to sell out in bulk. On the tenth of April he came before his creditors and stated that the \$16,000. worth of merchandise which he had obtained from them had been entirely disposed of and he was unable to account for any of the proceeds, except that he had gambled some away. He was likewise unable to account for the capital of approximately \$16,000. with which he claimed to have started business.

At the time Nosovitsky obtained credit from these different companies, he gave as a reference Mr. J. E. Hoover of the Department of Justice. After this several of the companies received letters over the signature of one J. E. Hoover in which it was stated that the writer considered Nosovitsky thoroughly honest and his integrity above suspicion. As matters now stand, in checking up this transaction the creditors are in grave doubt as to whether it was J. E. Hoover of the Department of Justice who actually wrote these letters of commendation.

Nosovitsky also stated to me last Saturday that it would be highly unfortunate if criminal proceedings were instituted against him for the reason that at the present time he is working in a most important capacity for Arthur Woods in investigating the Wall Street bomb explosion. Nosovitsky claims that he was in the Department of Justice under Bruce Bielaski for a number of years.

I am wondering if you could find out from Assistant Attorney General Hoover whether he actually wrote these letters. If not, what is the name of the person who wrote them?

Dear Mr. Hill,-

I am in receipt of your communication of May 1, 1922, making certain inquiries concerning Dr. Jacob Nosovitsky.

I talked with Mr. Hoover, of this Bureau, concerning Nosovitsky, and am advised by him that he was employed in the Department of Justice in 1917 or 1918, under Mr. Bielaski. At that time he worked out of our New York office. He has had no connection in an official capacity with this Department since that time.

(X) Mr. Hoover met Nosovitsky in 1919, who at that time was making certain investigations for the British. From time to time Nosovitsky saw Mr. Hoover in New York, but at no time was there any official relationship established between Mr. Hoover and Nosovitsky in so far as the Department of Justice was concerned. Nosovitsky was introduced to Mr. Hoover through a mutual friend, and their relationship was strictly personal.

Upon receiving communications from several tire concerns Mr. Hoover replied in an unofficial and personal capacity, advising these concerns that he had no knowledge of Nosovitsky's financial standing, but so far as he had known him personally he had found his integrity above suspicion, and considered him honest. He stated specifically that his relations with Nosovitsky had involved no pecuniary element, and he could, therefore, give no information concerning his financial standing. Mr. Hoover informs

me that until this occurrence Nosovitsky had always given indication of being thoroughly reliable. He performed very valuable services, I am told, for the British intelligence units, and was held in high esteem by them, as well as by persons for whom he had worked in this country in a private capacity.]

I am informed that Nosovitsky was at one time employed by Colonel Woods to follow certain leads in connection with the Wall Street bomb explosion. This relationship, however, was terminated in the spring of last year, and Nosovitsky has not received any compensation since that time. At the time of the receipt of the last payment to him by Colonel Woods Nosovitsky had not obtained any very definite information upon the investigation, and he is in honor bound to supply such information as he may be able to procure without, however, payment of any additional sum.

The above, of course, I am telling you in strictest confidence.

I have been going through our accounts and I have read Captain Liddell's letter to you of the 28th July and your reply of the 11th August, regarding the question of repayment of a sum of £750 which was advanced to "Jack". I think that Captain Liddell, in writing to you, did not quite represent the position regarding the repayment of this money.

I think it is quite clear from my papers and also from my own remembrance of the case that Jack's services were only passed on to you on condition that the retainer was repaid by your people.

When Jack left this country he went off with the retainer. Your telegram to us and our reply was sent after Jack had started and was engaged on work for us. 2. Despatch of our telegram to you or Colonel Arthur Woods 21st June, 1921.
3. Jack returned from Mexico somewhere about the 18th April, 1921, on the s.s. "Acquitania" a week or so previous, I think, to your and Colonel Arthur Woods' arrival as I have a note in the file that you were proposing to sail on the 20th April, 1921 on the s.s. "Olympic".

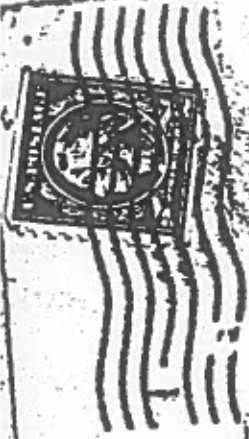

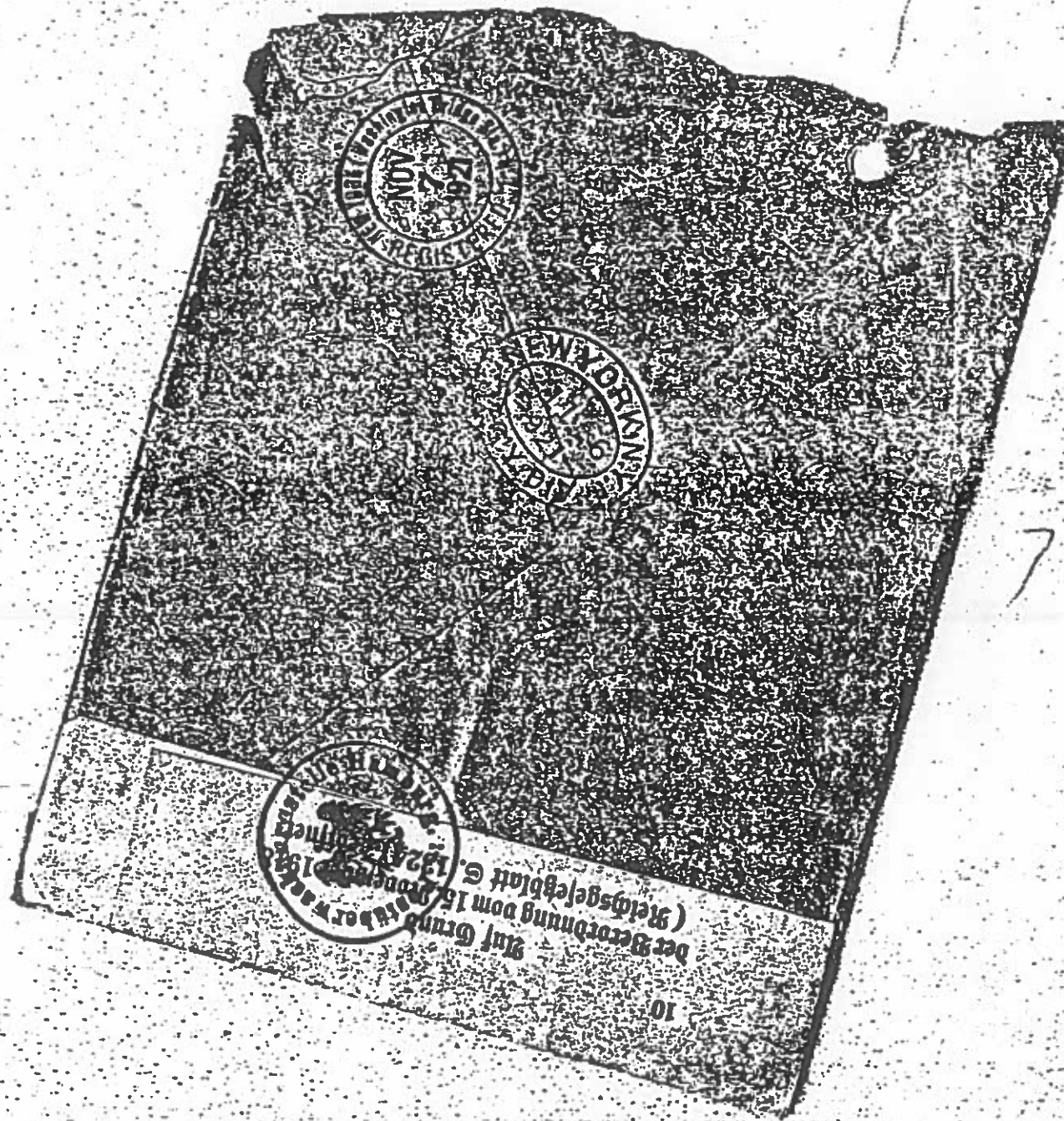



Upon his arrival in Frisco my assistant learned that a man by the name Korolenko who was from New York lived in Frisco four months but left for Alaska. When my assistant was about to take a trip to Alaska he found out that there are several other Korolenko's living in San Francisco and all of them came from the East... Not being able to communicate with me because I was in Europe at that time, my assistant returned to New York. In November 1921 I came back to the States determined to uncover conclusive evidence against Dudinsky before I make another attempt to bring him here. In September 1921 when I was in Berlin I met a German Communist by the name Carl Shomer to whom I had a letter of introduction from Sylvia Pankhurst. While discussing with Shomer the Revolutionary movement in the United States I mentioned to him the Wall street bomb explosion. Shomer said that he knows all about it from Dr. Misligh who told him that the explosion was the act of a crazy young Russian. The Communist Party and the I.W.W had nothing to do with this cruel, unnecessary act.

(Dr. Misligh is now in Russia. He was in Berlin a few weeks previous to my conversation with Shomer)

In January 1921, while I was having dinner at the Russian Restaurant "Moscow" in New York, I met Gregory Vasilchuk a former member of the Passaic N.J. Group of the Communist Party. I learned from Vasilchuk that he just arrived from Wilkes Barre, Pa. and is on his way to Canada to live on a farm near Edmonton. Remembering Vasilchuk as a good friend of Dudinsky and hoping to obtain some information I invited Vasilchuk to stay at my house during the time he intended to remain in New York. Vasilchuk lived in my house six days and after I secured his full confidence I was able to get <sup>out</sup> of him the following information:-

One evening in August or September in 1919, Dudinsky came to his house accompanied by an other young Russian who carried a heavy

There is no doubt in my mind, said Vasilchuk, that the wall street bomb explosion was the work of Dudinsky and his accomplices from the Newark Communist Group.

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

### MEMORANDUM FOR MR. BURNS.

You will recall that sometime ago inquiry was made concerning certain work which a man by the name of Jacob Nosovitsky was performing for Colonel Woods in connection with the Wall Street bomb explosion. The question arose in connection with a letter addressed to you by a credit concern in New York concerning Nosovitsky, in view of the fact that he had applied for credit and had given the name of Colonel Woods.

The facts in the case were that Colonel Woods had engaged Nosovitsky early in 1921 to follow out certain leads which Nosovitsky felt he had upon the Wall Street bomb explosion. He received a sum of money at that time but received no additional funds after then. Nosovitsky then went to Poland and returned with little or no results and was told by Colonel Woods that he could have no additional funds and that it was incumbent upon him to complete the investigation. This was in 1921, before you assumed the duties of Director. The theory that Nosovitsky had at that time was that the explosion in Wall Street had been the work of certain Communists in New Jersey. He had a vague idea as to who it was and his purpose in going to Russia was to get in touch with a man by the name of Dudinsky, but he failed to obtain permission to enter Russia and, consequently, did not obtain any results.

Nosovitsky returned to the United States and last year, when I was in New York, I ran across him and endeavored to ascertain what information he had upon the matter as I thought you might want to have the benefit of it. Upon his arrival in Frisco my assistant learned that a man by the name Korolenko who was from New York live in Frisco four months but left for Alaska. When my assistant was about to take a trip to Alaska he found out that there are several other Korolenko's living in San Francisco and all of them came from East. Not being able to communicate with me because I was in Europe at that time, my assistant returned to New York. In November, 1922, he came back to the States determined to uncover conclusive evidence against Dudinsky before I made another attempt to bring him here. Year of the most difficult investigations has produced excellent results - I have that evidence.

I possess sufficient intelligence and experience to be able to pass my judgment on what constitutes conclusive evidence. On a man with a diseased mind or a man who is looking for his own destruction could afford to trifle with such a serious matter as the Wall Street bomb explosion.

In September, 1921, when I was in Berlin I met a German Communist by the name of Carl Shomer to whom I had a letter of introduction from Sylvia Panthurst. While discussing with Shomer the revolutionary movement in the United States I mentioned to him the explosion. Shomer said that he knows all about it from Mr. Hil told him that the explosion was the act of a crazy young Russian Communist Party and the I.W.O. has nothing to do with this or necessary act. (Mr. Hilig is now in Russia. He was in Berlin

weeks previous to my conversation with Shomer.)

In January, 1921, while I was having dinner at the Russian Restaurant "Moscow" in New York I met Gregory Vasilchuk, a former member of the Passaic, New Jersey, group of the Communist Party. I learned from Vasilchuk that he just arrived from Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, and is on his way to Canada to live on a farm near Edmonton. Remembering Vasilchuk as a good friend of Dudinsky and hoping to obtain some information I invited Vasilchuk to stay at my house during the time he intended to remain in New York. Vasilchuk lived in my house six days and after I secured his full confidence I was able to get out of him the following information:

One evening in August or September in 1919, Dudinsky came to his house accompanied by another young Russian who carried a heavy valise. Dudinsky asked Vasilchuk to take care of the valise until he calls for it in a day or two. Dudinsky warned him that the valise contained explosives. Vasilchuk refused to harbor the valise because he thought he is being suspected by the local police. Dudinsky then took the explosives to a friend in Cliffside, N. J. Vasilchuk said that Dudinsky once told him that he has a few bombs to be used when the proper time comes.

There is no doubt in my mind, said Vasilchuk, that the Wall Street bomb explosion was the work of Dudinsky and his accomplices from the Newark Communist group.

(I believe that Vasilchuk can be located and easily persuaded to sign an affidavit to substantiate his statement).

There exists a letter written by Dudinsky to a friend in New York. In this letter Dudinsky freely discusses the Wall Street affair. He says in part: I have no regret for the victims of the explosion. I think that the effect produced by the bomb was worth the sacrifice. Unbearable oppression prevailing in America demands another loud and the tyrants of the working class. You will eventually have to employ force as the only effective weapon in the class struggle. Shall you side to take some action. I am sure you will be very successful.

This letter and other indisputable evidence will be available when the authorities put Dudinsky on trial for his life.

I wish to say that I am not impetuous to go to Soviet Russia to bring Dudinsky here. I would rather stay in the States and let somebody else do that job, provided that the "somebody" can induce I to leave Russia voluntarily and come voluntarily to the States or I personally do not know who could serve the purpose except myself friend and assistant C.S. It is possible that some clever fellow able to entice Dudinsky across the Russian border into one of the States and then bring him here by force, but such an act would be timely against my plans because it would minimize the value of my action and possibly destroy the whole case on which so much time, money has been spent. According to my plans Dudinsky will gladly



me to England where we will remain for about a month and then proceed to the United States.

P.S. During the past five months my assistant established friendly relations with Jacob Dudinsky (alias Dudyk, alias Aorolenko) who is a cousin of Ivan Dudinsky. We were able to intercept some letters sent by Dudinsky from Russia to Dudyk in Newark, New Jersey. I suspect Dudyk of being an accomplice of Ivan Dudinsky, but have no definite evidence against him yet.

In the interview which Mosovitsky had with me, he was very inquisitive as to whether or not there could be advanced any money to carry on the investigation. I told him that I did not know whether there could or could not be any money advanced but I believed that Colonel Woods would not give him any more money in view of the conversations which I had with Colonel Woods early in 1921.

You will note from his story that it is more or less general and the fallacy in the story is that Dudinsky, the man whom he believes was instrumental in blowing up Wall Street, was deported from the United States several months before the Wall Street explosion and was not in the country at the time this explosion took place. Mosovitsky does not know this fact. There is nothing in his story which in any way links with Linde's story and it would seem to be of little value. However, when I talked with Mosovitsky in New York last week I thought it was desirable to obtain from him the substance of the facts, because I understood him to say he was leaving New York for the west and I did not know when I would ever run across him again.

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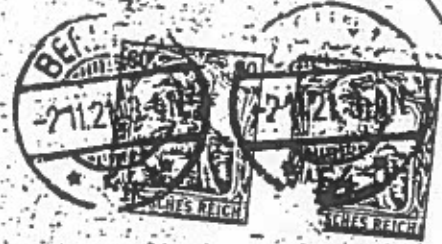
