There is a man in New York City by the name of Dr. Jacob Nosovitsky who last February started in the retail automobile tire and accessories business. Upon statements made in writing as to his credit and financial status, which were apparently false, he obtained credit from tire manufacturers for merchandise of a value of about 316,000. first week of April, 1922, Nosovitsky started to sell out in bulk. On the tenth of April he came before his creditors and stated that the \$16,000. worth of merchandise which he had obtained from them had been entirely disposed of and he was unable to account for any of the proceeds, except that he had gambled same away. He was likewise unable to account for the capital of approximately \$15,000. with which he claimed to have started business.

At the time Mosovitsky obtained credit from these different companies, he gave as a reference Mr.J.T.Hoover of the Depart ent of Mustice. After this several of the companies received letters over the signature of one J.H.Hoover in which it was stated that the writer considered Mosovitsky thoroughly honest and his integrity above suspicion. As matters now stand, in checking up this transaction the creditors are in grave doubt as to whether it was J.E.Hoover of the Department of Justice who actually wrote these letters of commendation.

Hosovitsky also stated to me last Saturday that it would be highly unfortunate if criminal proceedings were instituted against him for the reason that at the present time he is working in a most important capacity for Arthur Joods in investigating the Tall Itreet bomb explosion. Nosovitsky claims that he was in the Department of Justice under Brice Fields in for a number of years.

I am in receipt of your communication of Hay 1, 1988, making cortain impuiries concerning Dr. Jacob Nosovitsky.

I talked with Mr. Hoover, of this Bureau, concerning Nosovitsky, and am advised by him that he was employed in the Department of Justice in 1917 or 1918, under Mr. Bielaski. At that time he worked out of our New York office. He has had no connection in an official capacity with this Department since that time.

Hr. Hoover met Nosovitsky in 1819, who at that time was making certain investigations for the British. From time to time Nosovitsky saw Mr. Hoover in New York, but at no time was there any official relationship established between Mr. Hoover and Nosovitsky in so far as the Department of Justice was concerned. Nosovitsky was introduced to Mr. Hoover through a mutual friend, and their relationship was strictly personal.

Upon receiving communications from several tire concerns Mr. Hoover replied in an unofficial and personal capacity, advising these concerns that he had no knowledge of Mosovitsky's financial standing, but so far as he had known him personally he had found his integrity above suspicion, and considered him honest. He stated specifically that his relations with Mosovitsky had involved no pecuniary element, and he could, therefore, give no information concerning his financial standing. Mr. Hoover informs







In this report I am transmitting to You Information which are absolutely correct and which have firmly convinced me that Ivan Dudinsky is the man we must go after if we want to bring an end to the numerous and expensive Investigations in connection with the Wall street case.

Whatever I said in my report is final.

I have no more Information to submit at the present time and no more evidence to offer until the time comes for actual prosecution of the guilty.

A few weeks after my visit to Newark, the Executive Committee received definite information that Dudinsky has in his possession a large quantity of dynamite which he intended to use for the purpose of manufacturing bombs. Believing that Dudinsky's action may bring disastrous results, the Exec. Comm. demanded an explanation. Dudinsky did not deny the fact that he has explosives, but assured the members of the Committee that he is not going to do anything yet, when I decide to make good use of my "playthings", said Dudinsky, no other member of the Party will be implicated in it...

In view of the fact that Dudinsky was very popular among the members of the Party and also because he had a great ability - to collect money for the Party paper the "Hovy Lir", the Committee let the matter drop completely.

My efforts to locate the bombs made by Dudinsky were frustrated by my departure to Europe, nevertheless I reported Dudinsky to the New York office of the Department of Justice. Then the Wall street bomb explosion came and I was engaged to work on the case.

I went to work and after two months reported to You the following Information:-

After I have investigated many class and have climinated more than fifteen men from the list of persons suspected of being implicated in this crime - my investigation narrowed to two men - Dudinsky and Korolenko.

Dudinsky was in Russia and Korolenko, according to rumors, has gone to San Francisco. I send my assistant to Frisco while I went to Europe with the intention to enter Russia and locate Dudinsky. You know the reasons which forced me to return to the States without accomplishing any definite results. By assistant who went after Korolenko also failed to get his man... Upon his arrival in Frisco my assistant learned that a man by the name Korolenko who was from New York lived in Frisco four months but left for Alaska. When my assistant was about to take a trip to Alaska he found out that there are several other Korolenko's living in San Francisco and all of them came from the East... Not being able to communicate with me because I was in Europe at that time, my assistant returned to New York. In November 1921 I came back to the States determined to uncover conclusive evidence against Dudinsky before I make an other attempt to bring him here. A year of the most difficult Investigations has produced excellent results - I have that evidence. I possess sufficient Intelligence and experience to be able to pass

I possess sufficient Intelligence and experience to be able to pass my judgment on what constitutes conclusive evidence.

Only a madman with a diseased mind or a man who is looking for his own destruction could afford to trifle with such a serious matter as the Wall street bomb explosion...

In September 1921 when I was in Berlin I met a German Communist by the name Carl Shomer to whom I had a letter of introduction from Sylvia Pankhurst. While discussing with Shomer the Revolutionary movement in the United States I mentioned to him the Wall street bomb explosion. Shomer said that he knows all about it from Dr. Mislig who told him that the explosion was the act of a crazy young Russian. The Communist Party and the I.W.W had nothing to do with this cruel, unnecessary act.

(Dr. Mislig is now in Russia. He was in Berlin a few weeks previous to my conversation with Shomer)



MEMOPA TOTAL FOR LT. BUTIS.

You will recall that sometime ago inquiry was made concerning certain work which a man by the name of Jacob woscvilary was performing for Colonel Woods in connection with the Wall Street bomb explosion. The question arose in connection with a letter addressed to you by a credit concern in New York concerning Rosovitsky, in view of the fact that he had applied for credit and had given the name of Colonel woods.

Nosovitsky early in 1921 to follow out certain leads which Mosovitsky felt he had upon the Wall Street bomb explosion. He received a sum of money at that time but received no additional funds after them. Rossvitsky then went to Poland and returned with little or no results and was told by Colonel woods that he could have no additional funds and that it was incumbent upon him to complete the investigation. This was in 1921, before you assumed the duties of Director. The theory that Wossvitshy had at that time was that the explicit in wall street had seen the work of certain Communists in New Jersey. He had a value idea as to who it was and his purpose in going to mussia was to get in touch with a man by the name of Dudinshy, but he failed to obtain permission to enter Russia and, our sequently, did not obtain any results.

Hosovits y returned to the United States and last weet, when I was in it work. I ran across him and endeavored to ascertain what information he had done the matter as I thought you might want to have the benefit of it. So far as I know, he never had submitted a detailed memorandum upon his work. Such memorandums as he had written early in 1921 were all general, and I was able to get him to give me a memorandum of the results of his observations, which is as follows:

I told him that I aid not know whether there could or could not be any money advanced but I believed that Colohel Woods would not give him any more money in view of the conversations which I had with Colonel Woods early in 1921.

You will note from his story that it is more or less general and the fallacy in the story is that Dudinsky, the man whom he believes was instrumental in blowing up Wall street, was deported from the United States several months before the Wall street explosion and was not in the country at the time this explosion took place. Hosovitsky does not know this fact. There is nothing in his story which in any way links with winds's story and it would seem to be of little value. However, when I takes with Posovitsky in New York last week I thought it was desirable to obtain from him the substance of the facts, became I understood him to say he was leaving New York for the west and I did not know when I would ever run scross him again.

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
